ATIONAL HOMELESSNESS MARATHON COMES TO WSL

n its 17 years, the Homelessness Marathon has visited 17 cities to broadcast an informative and humanizing picture of homelessness. This year, Sarasota and WSLR welcome Jeremy Alderson, the creator of the Marathon, to bring the 14hour broadcast to our airwaves.

Having experienced homelessness firsthand, Alderson was inspired to create the broadcast after he received the opportunity to work at a community radio station overnight. With hours of radio time on his hands and the struggle of homelessness fresh in his mind, Alderson felt that

In an unprecedented and unmatched effort, Alderson brought advocates, lawmakers and homeless individuals together to talk about homelessness. His first broadcast was 12 hours long and the first of its kind to hear the voices of homeless people live on the air.

"When I started the broadcast, I was haranguing people, saving 'You should care, this is a

national disgrace," Alderson said. "After that, I realized people do care."

By the next year, the Homelessness Marathon had seven cities who wanted to pull the broadcast to their stations. Today, the Marathon has over 70 subscribers and affiliates nationwide who support and broadcast Alderson's initiative.

"I all of a sudden realized when I looked at the response that this had captured people's imaginations," Alderson said. In the past, Alderson has chosen

an issue this serious and close to his heart must different cities based on his relationship with radio stations or their geographic benefits, but

he didn't come to Sarasota for white, sandy beaches. "It seems like every city in Florida, in one year or another, has been named the worst city in the country," he explained. "Sarasota was on that list and it was the place where we had the best affiliate - WSLR - whom we had worked with in the past." With Sarasota's homeless receiving more and more media attention and with a trusted partner in WSLR, Alderson decided to bring the show to us.



had a great run so far and in the past we have added a 5 Kilowatt Solar power system (Region Solar), a cistern rain water collection system (Rain Drop Cisterns), 80 gallon solar hot water (Mirasol FAFCO), LED lights (Eco-Smart), and recycling stations (provided by the Farmers Market). We will do more with your help. Looking ahead at our home here on Kumquat Court, we have room for 5 more kilowatts of solar and we would like to stop using plastic water bottles and put in a drinking water filtration system and porous

pavers in our patio would allow the rain to get to the mother earth. What would you like for the community in the coming year? Co-op Housing, a Food Co-op, expansion of the Legacy Trail all the way to the airport and more housing for homeless? Day by day we can make the change together. Thanks to Occupy Radio Co-host Rivera Sun for her visit and her book "The Dandelion Insurrection."



MARATHONS & METERS LOW POWER TO THE PEOPLE!

One of the many community issues that we at WSLR concern ourselves with is homelessness. Two events in February will bring special attention to this dilemma: the February 16th screening of the film "Overcriminalized" followed by a panel discussion, and-the next day-the 17th Annual Homelessness Marathon, broadcast nation-wide but held for the first time right here in Sarasota from 7 p.m. February 17 until 9 a.m. the next morning. See homelessnessmarathon.org for the podcasts. We hope that the national publicity will gain us some listeners and educate everyone about this continuing community problem.

An update on our solar power: Our panels are operational and the proper meter has been installed, allowing us to generate five kilowatts of power and also to return any unneeded power to the grid for credit. We're thinking of a second 5KW set of panels, and we may be asking for donations to help make this happen.

Finally, we on the board would like to know what you think about what our mission should be and, also, which issues should concern us. We would like ideas from the community. To tell us in person, why not attend one of our monthly board meetings at the station? They occur on the third Monday at 7 p.m., and there's always a spot on the agenda for public input.

"I don't think the folks at WSLR know this, but the original concept was to do something that would get us arrested, or force the authorities to make a decision about arresting us. We were thinking we would go somewhere where feeding homeless people was illegal and feed homeless people as part of the broadcast," Alderson said. "When I got to Sarasota, I realized it's not that bad. I'm not planning on getting arrested - let's put it that way."

"No city solves homelessness alone; it's a national problem, it requires federal policies," Alderson added.

While Alderson's main goal is to get the voices of the oft-unheard homeless population on the air, he also hopes that the **Homelessness Marathon** can impact a community. "We're in a consciousness-raising phase; we're just trying to turn over the Earth."

"This is not a popular movement; the homeless are isolated, they have few advocates," Alderson added. We're just in a phase of lighting a candle in the dark. We just don't have the kind of movement that we need."

FINDING A PATH TO PEACE A PALESTINE/ISRAEL EDUCATION

The Peace Education and Action Center, the Center for Religious Tolerance, the Women's Interfaith Network, WSLR Community Radio, the Venice Interfaith Community Association, and the Suncoast ANSWER Coalition will be co-sponsoring an educational series on Palestine/Israel. The series kicked off on Sunday, Jan. 25, at the Fogartyville Community Media & Arts Center (525 Kumquat Court) and continues every other Sunday until March 22. The cost for the entire series is \$20 and interested parties are encouraged to attend each event in the series to promote a more informed exchange at the final event. The series is **FREE** for individuals with a current student ID.

event will involve facilitated small group discussion. In explaining why the PEA-Center supports this project, Sweeting said, "It's rare to have an open and honest dialogue about the situation in Israel/Palestine in this country. We hope this series will challenge people to delve more deeply into the history of this conflict, open their hearts to the people involved, and come away with a better understanding of what it will take to bring about a different future."

In January, Tzvia Their kicked off the series Sunday, January 25, with a discussion of her life story. Tzvia spoke about her attachment to Zionism and her decision to break with it. In her life, she has authored Zionist texts for children, taught in Jewish day schools in the U.S., and her son was killed while serving in the Israeli army in 1983 in Lebanon.

There will be multiple events in February. On Sunday, February 8, at 6:30 pm, there will be a film screening of "On the Side of the Road." The film will be in Hebrew and Arabic.

West Former Bank settler **Lia** Tarachansky looks at Israelis' collective amnesia of the fateful events of 1948 when the state of Israel was born and most of the Palestinians be-

came refugees. She follows the transformation of Israeli veterans trying to uncover their denial of the war that changed the region forever. Tarachansky then turns the camera on herself and travels back to her settlement where that historical erasure gave birth

A panel discussion will follow each to a new generation, blind and isolated of the first three events and the final from its surroundings. Attempting to shed a light on the country's biggest taboo, she is met with outrage and violence. There will be a small fee for this screening.

> Sunday, February 22, at 6:30 pm, Encounter Point, a story dealing with nonviolence movements, will be shown.

Encounter Point tells the story of Israelis and Palestinians who sacrifice their



safety, public standing, and homes in order to press for a grassroots movement for nonviolence and peace.

Where Should the Birds Fly, the first film about Gaza made by Palestinians living in the reality of Israel's siege and blockade of the tiny enclave, will be shown Sunday, March 8, at 6:30 pm It is the story of two young women, survivors of Israel's Operation Cast Lead. Mona Samouni, now 12 years old, and the filmmaker, Fida Qishta, now 27, represent the spirit and future of Palestinians. The film is a visual

documentation of the Goldstone Report. But it is so much more. It reveals the strength and hope, the humanity and humor that flourishes among the people of Gaza. Few films document so powerfully and personally the impact of modern warfare and sanctions on a civilian population. For more information. whereshouldthebirdsfly.org The series will conclude Sunday,
