



This innovative group has been a entitled Freefall "source" of vital, life-saving information in the Sarasota community for over thirty years. Since its creation in 1981 by the Southwest and Central Florida branch of **Planned Parenthood**. The SOURCE has been helping to educate and spread awareness about social issues that impact the health and well-being of teens and young adults everywhere.

The SOURCE does this by creating a variety of widely accessible content. award-winning including plavs. videos, short films, and public service announcements. Each piece focuses on issues that affect and impact young lives. These include bullying, drug and alcohol addiction, teen pregnancy, HIV/AIDS prevention, sexual violence, and prescription drug overdose.

#### What have they been up to?

As part of V-Day, a global movement focused on ending violence against women and girls all over the world(see article above), The SOURCE will be presenting a new piece called TAPE. TAPE will raise awareness about sexual assault by



showing how one incident changed the lives of three high school friends who have reunited ten years later. The play contains adult content and explores, through realistic and stirring portrayals, the aftermath of sexual assault.

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## **WSLR Joins the V-Day Community to Rise for Justice for Women**

### The truth is shocking.

According to the United Nations, one of every three women on the planet will be physically or sexually abused in her lifetime. Although sources of violence may seem diverse, women's responses sound tragically similar. Besides the pain and strength you will hear in their survival stories, the themes that resound across cultures and geographies are of the indifference of authorities, the familial instinct of denial, and the lack of public outrage about the violence that millions of women experience every day.

V-Day was born from the belief that, until these themes are addressed. the violence will continue. The 'V' in use the proceeds for local individual V-Day stands for Victory, Valentine and Vagina.

In 1994, a play called The Vagina Monologues, written by playwright and activist Eve Ensler, broke ground, offering to the world a piece of art like nothing it had seen before. Based on dozens of interviews Ensler conducted with women, the 14 FEBRUARY 2014 play addressed women's sexuality and the social

stigma surrounding rape and abuse, on our website. Please stay tuned: Ensler found women waiting to share

their own stories of survival, leading her to see that The Vagina Monologues could be more than a moving work of art on violence - performances could actually be a mechanism for moving people to act to end violence.

On Valentines Day, 1998, Eve, with a group of women in New York City, established the 501c3 V-Day. V-Day's mission is simple. It demands that violence against women and girls must end. To do this, once a year, in February, March, and April, Eve Ensler allows groups around the world to produce a performance of the play, as well as other works created by V-Day, and

projects and programs that work to end violence against women and girls, often shelters and rape crisis centers. What began as one event in New York City in 1998 today includes over 5,800 V-Day events annually.

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


